Tina called the meeting to order with 17 present.

Treasurer's report: we have \$6, 019.80 in checking. Nancy Evans sent a check for \$782.50 from the sales of Alice's lace at IOLI.

IOLI Conference: everyone who attended had a great time. River took a Cantu class and one on attaching lace to a hanky. Marilyn took Bruges as an all-day class and Valerie took Floral Beds.

Next year's conference will be in Raleigh, North Carolina. 2027 will be back in Spokane, Washington.

OIDFA's next congress will be in Lanzarote, in the Canary Islands.

Demos:

Yamhill County Fair went well, but it was just Joyce demonstrating alone, and people were reluctant to come up and chat. It seems that having a group demonstrating makes us more approachable.

Lynda, Pauline, and Lise demonstrated at the Clark County Fair.

Henry Rose went to Clackamas County Fair and had a lot of interest.

State Fair was fun: we had three demonstrating on Sunday and seven on Wednesday.

Molalla Apple Fest: we had three people demonstrating this year but they would like to give us more space for more demonstrators, next year.

Festival of Quilts is at the Wingspan Event Center:
Melissa will bring a few chairs – contact her if you would like to use one of hers. Otherwise, bring your own chair and worktable for your lace. Parking is \$10, so carpool, if you can.

Oregon Flock and Fiber is coming up in October Magic at the Mill is in November.

Bev raised the concern that there were only three tatting entries in the State Fair last year and no bobbin lace; this year there were no entries of either kind. If we don't enter our lace, they could decide to drop the categories, entirely. It's important that we revisit the topic of fair entries early next year so that our members can think about what they've completed and what they want to enter. Unfortunately, the State Fair doesn't have the satellite drop-off and pickup sites for our entries in the metro area anymore, so it's a drive to Salem to enter. Maybe we can discuss collecting the entries at the Thursday meeting and having one of our Salem members drop them off?

We had a lively discussion regarding the recent requests for us to pay for demonstrating (think about creating a budget item?), why we demonstrate, and which kinds of demonstrations bring in more interested members. Perhaps collecting emails for interested people, providing more promo material, and finding new venues where people interested in lacemaking might be found: yarn stores, museums, farmers markets, etc.

Salem Fiber Arts Guild is asking for someone to teach a one-day lace class at the Yamill Historical Society in 2026 on a Saturday, mid-morning. It would be a 30-minute presentation and then a basic lesson for 15 or so people. We have requests like this come in on occasion; it might be time to set up a committee to handle teaching requests.

Tina flies out on 10/15 for Wales and will be gone for six months, minimum. As VP, Melissa will be leading the meetings. We will need someone to be the acting VP, to help out until the next elections.

Halas Style Lace -LeAnn

LeAnn took a class on Halas Lace. She told me that only Hungarians can truly make Halas Lace so hers is only Halas Style.

I was intrigued and thought what a great learning opportunity. The technique is based out of the location



of Kiskunhalas, where it is passed on from generation to generation and used by folklore industrial artists. It is considered Hungary's ambassador to the world as it is gifted to notable visitors, such as Queen Elisabeth II, a Japanese Empress, and Pope John Paul II.



With David's retirement we are able to go spend some quality time in Wales




